Children would no longer receive transport to these two centres: Glenbrae and Bluebird. Although this will have some impact on those who use the service, this is expected to be minimal because most families live within the defined catchment area of establishments.

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Consultation/engagement	Budget Consultation 2024/26 Phase 1: This BSP was one of 5 included in the <i>Schools and Early Years</i> section of the survey ⁵ . It was ranked number 3 by respondents.
	Budget Consultation 2024/26 Phase 2: This BSP was one of 16 included in the Budget Consultation 2024/26 Phase 2 ⁶ . It was ranked number 15 by respondents.
	Consultation has taken place with Council colleagues who provide the transport to support the devising of the BSP.
	According to Clyde Conversations respondents, 92% did not agree with stopping free transport to the Bluebird Family Centre and the Glenbrae Children's Centre.
	Consultation has taken place with the parents and carers of children who attend the Bluebird Family Centre and the Glenbrae Children's Centre. Respondents said that the impact of this BSP would be that children's attendance at the Centres may be affected and that identifying alternative means of transport would be challenging.

Officers' knowledge and experience (including feedback from frontline staff)	As in Section 6. There are two specialist additional support needs (ASN) establishments for early learning and childcare where transport is provided. This is due to children being referred to the service and living out with the area. All other children who attend early learning establishments in Inverclyde do not receive transport, with the exception of ASN provision, as outlined above.
Equalities monitoring data	15 children who currently attend Bluebird and Glenbrae Early Learning Centres receive transport. This is

There is no statutory entitlement to transport for early years children.

Not all centres have access to transport and this has previously been used to help families access early years provision. The service pre-dates 1140 hours and the need for its use has become less and less over time.

This BSP would impact on the provision of internal Council transport.
