Subject: National Care Service Update

1.0 PURPOSE

1.1 The purpose of this paper is to update the Integration Joint Board on the recent publication of the National Care Service (Scotland) Bill and to request delegated authority to the Interim Chief Officer to compile a suitable response.

2.0 SUMMARY

- 2.1 On the 20 June 2022 the Scottish Government introduced the National Care Service (Scotland) Bill to the Scottish Parliament proposing the creation of a new National Care Service.
- 2.2 As part of the Bill's progress, the Scottish Parliament's Health, Social Care and Sport Committee has published a Call for Views on the terms of the Bill. Both the Call for Views and the Your Priorities digital consultation will close on Friday 2 September.
- 2.3 The Interim Chief Officer requires delegated authority to compile a suitable response on this latest consultation on behalf of Inverclyde Integration Joint Board.

3.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3.1 That the IJB notes the latest update in relation to the establishment of the National Care Service.
- 3.2 That the IJB grants delegated authority to the Interim Chief Officer to submit a response to the Scottish Parliament's Call for Views on the National Care Service (Scotland) Bill on behalf of the Inverclyde Integration Joint Board by 2 September 2022.

4.0 BACKGROUND

- 4.1 The Scottish Government undertook a public consultation on its proposals for a National Care Service (NCS) to achieve changes to the system of community health and social care in Scotland. - 4.2 On the 20 June 2022 the Scottish Government introduced the National Care Service (Scotland) Bill to the Scottish Parliament, proposing the creation of a new National Care Service. The Bill allows Scottish Ministers to transfer social care responsibility from local authorities to a new, national service. This could include adult and children's services, as well as areas such as justice social work. Scottish Ministers will also be able to transfer healthcare functions from the NHS to the proposed National Care Service. Care or health services transferred to the new service could be delivered nationally or locally. The Bill proposes that new bodies called "care boards" would be responsible for delivering care locally.
- 4.3 As well as proposing to establish a National Care Service, the Bill makes other changes including:
 - allowing information to be shared by the proposed National Care Service and the NHS
 - introducing a right to breaks for carers
 - giving rights to people living in adult care homes to see the people important to them (known as "Anne's Law")
- 4.4 The Bill requires further public consultation to be held and the results to be laid before Parliament alongside any regulations prior to any potential transfer of children's services and justice social work services. This recognises that those areas were not specifically examined by the Independent Review of Adult Social Care.
- 4.5 There are two options for those wishing to participate in this public consultation
 - 1. Call for Views-This includes general questions about the Bill, questions about the Financial Memorandum and the option to provide more detailed comments on individual sections of the Bill. It is primarily aimed at groups and organisations who are looking to input their views on the Bill.  - 2. Your Priorities digital consultation-This offers an opportunity to ask questions or to highlight specific hopes or concerns about the Bill. Respondents can also rate specific provisions in the Bill (agree, disagree, don't know) and make brief comments about them. The Your Priorities digital consultation offers an opportunity for individual members of the public to give their views about the Bill.
- 4.6 Both the Call for Views and the *Your Priorities* digital consultation will close on Friday 2 September 2022.
- 4.7 The Interim Chief Officer requires delegated authority to compile a suitable response on this latest consultation on behalf of Inverclyde Integration Joint Board.
