1.0 PURPOSE

1.1 This report advises Members of progress made by the Education & Communities Directorate in achieving its objectives relating to the work and remit of the Safe, Sustainable Communities Committee, as set out in the Directorate Plan for 2010/11.

2.0 SUMMARY

All of the key outcomes of the new LHS have been refined over the period up to December 2010 and a series of Outcome Group meetings will be held over the next two months to inform the Consultative Draft LHS. The main consultation period will be from May to September 2011 to allow for preparation of the final draft for submission to committee in October. Committee agreed in May 2009 that the main aims and objectives of the LHS 2004 – 2009 would be rolled forward until the first "new style" LHS had been completed and no further review is necessary pending the completion of the Consultative Draft LHS. A Working Draft HNDA was completed in December 2010 with consultation ending in mid-January 2011. The intention is to submit a final draft HNDA to the Joint Committee of the Glasgow and Clyde Valley Strategic Development Planning Authority in March 2011 followed by submission to the Scottish Government in May/June 2011. The results of the final HNDA will be used to inform the development of the new LHS (see above) and to provide housing supply targets for the new LHS (see above) and to provide housing supply targets for the new LHS by the Regeneration and Planning Service.

The results of the PSHCS will be used to inform the development of the Private Sector Strategy within the new LHS (see above) and to identify areas requiring investment in line with the Council's Scheme of Assistance. Expenditure on the various grants delivered under the Scheme of Assistance are progressing in line with anticipated spend profiles for legally committed expenditure and actual expenditure. Inverclyde Council have been in discussion with River Clyde Homes regarding their SHQS Investment Programme for 2010/11 and will formalise grant offers to relevant owners upon receipt of final project costs, owner's addresses and confirmation of owner's participation from RCH which are expected by the end of February 2011. The 2011/12 Scheme of Assistance budget will be the subject of a report to the May 2011 meeting of the Safe, Sustainable Communities Committee.

(4 – Slippage) It had been hoped that the service could take this forward as a joint working project with HSE in order to cover the widest possible range of businesses and organisations however recent cuts to HSE make it likely that there will be further delay in this. In 2011 therefore it is our intention to take a more limited and targeted programme forward with the Joint Civil Contingency Service. Initial discussions have taken place with CCS and a programme will be developed for delivery in 2011. It is likely that this will focus initially on the care sector.
