SUBJECT: Police and Fire Reform: Local Scrutiny and Engagement Inverclyde Local Policing Area Performance Results 1st April 2013 - 31st March 2014

1. Background

The Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012 sets out that the main purpose of policing is to improve the safety and well-being of persons, localities and communities in Scotland. It ensures an enhanced focus on local delivery of policing with a designated local commander for each local authority area accountable for local service provision. Each local commander is required to prepare a local policing plan that meets the needs of the local area and is approved by the local authority. In response to this the local authority has a statutory power to monitor the delivery of police services and to provide feedback to the local commander.

2. Inverclyde Local Police Plan

The Invercive Local Police Plan was published on 1^{st} April 2014. This plan sets out the local policing priorities and objectives for Invercive for 2014 – 2017. It will be reviewed annually through ongoing consultation and is supported by 6 ward community policing plans.

3. Performance reporting to Inverciyde Council

The local commander is required to provide reports at an agreed timescale for scrutiny by elected members. Formal scrutiny of the Inverclyde Police Plan falls under the governance of the Inverclyde Police and Fire Scrutiny Sub Committee under the auspices of the Education and Communities Committee which meets a minimum of two times per year.

4. Recommendation

The following data is extracted from Police Scotland internal systems and is correct as of 15th April 2014. The data is a year to date comparison with the previous year. It includes both recorded and detected crime data and covers all priority areas as set out in the local police plan. Members are asked to scrutinise policing performance for the period outlined and provide feedback where appropriate.

The level of violent crime in Invercive decreased by 8.8% compared to the previous year. This matches the overall force decrease in violent crime. The creation of the Invercive Alcohol and Violence Reduction Team and the continued emphasis of searching the right people in the right places has helped drive the decrease in robberies and assaults (serious and common) which has contributed greatly to this.

 38% of serious assaults occurred in private space behind closed doors which continues to prove challenging in terms of prevention and detection. 42% of recorded crimes have uncooperative complainers which makes intervention difficult. Enquiries are continuing into a number of these crimes with all lines of enquiry being thoroughly pursued. For 2014/15 the serious assault detection is set at 72%. 1 serious assault has been reported in Inverclyde which was detected.

 The reduction represents just over 36% below the 5-year average and is above the force target of a 3% decrease. The majority of serious assaults are linked to alcohol fuelled public space violence. The sub division continues to focus on working with the night-time economy businesses to educate staff, strengthen partnership working and prevent violence. 1 serious assault has been reported year to date which is a significant reduction on last year where there had been 7 reported.

8 Robbery detection rate 80.0% 52.0% 28.0% The robbery detection rate in Invercive has significantly increased compared to the previous year and exceeds the force target by 12%. The national robbery investigation and prevention toolkit which ensures a consistent and thorough approach to the investigation of reported robberies together with the robust targeting of known offenders has contributed to this. The Robbery detection rate for 2014/15 has increased to 72%.

This represents a 40% decrease on the 5 year average and exceeds the force target of reducing the number of robberies by 5%. A focus on target hardening strategies, working with local partners to increase awareness and providing advice to vulnerable people and premises together with intervention strategies on known offenders has contributed to this reduction in recorded robberies.

The detection rate for common assault is above the force average. We continue to prioritise reports of common assault to ensure all avenues are thoroughly investigated and ensure that intervention measures are put in place to prevent known offenders from re-offending. The Persistent Offender Partnership monitors known offenders with a dedicated officer working alongside alcohol and drugs workers to provide alternative pathways to repeat offenders with addictions.

The number of common assaults in Inverclyde has decreased by 13.1% compared to last year which is a significantly greater reduction than the force average. The majority of these crimes are perpetrated by persons known to their victims and are often alcohol fuelled. We continue to deploy resources in hot spot areas and work in conjunction with partners; particularly the Inverclyde Council Warden service and Anti-Social Behaviour Investigation Team to both deter and detect this type of crime. 27 common assaults have been reported since 1 st April 2014 within Inverclyde.

There has been a slight increase in the number of stop and searches conducted in Inverclyde compared to last year. Officers continue to focus on hot spot areas resulting in the right people being searched at key times. This method greatly assists in the prevention of crimes of violence and disorder and increases public reassurance. Hot spot areas are identified through public consultation, call analysis and partner's data which gives a better reflection of community concerns. The total number of stop searches conducted within Inverclyde year to date is 1,343. Focus remains on the identified hotspot areas.

The targeting of priority areas and by employing the 'right people/right place' methodology, Inverclyde has recorded a significant increase in positive stop and searches with 1 in 4 searches resulting in a positive detection. Inverclyde is continuing with the 1:4 ratio of positive stop searches this year, achieving a 25% positive rate, which is above the national rate of 20%.

Preventative work continues to be a priority for the force and the division. A dedicated officer works with partners to raise awareness and encourage reporting in line with national campaigns and government strategy.

This year the rate for detecting hate crime is 83%, with Inverclyde achieving 100%.

Drugs Supply and Use has been added as a local priority to the Inverclyde Police Plan for 2014-17 as a result of extensive public consultation. In the year ahead we will continue to gather intelligence and pursue those who persistently supply drugs to our local communities. The divisional pro-active crime team and the Alcohol and Violence Reduction Unit will be routinely tasked to pursue those involved in drugs supply and production with a view to increasing detection rates and deterring offenders. There have been 8 detections for drug supply, production and cultivation this year.

The introduction of the dedicated town centre officers, partly funded by Inverclyde Council, has assisted greatly in the detection of shoplifters within the town centre areas of Inverclyde. Enhanced partnership working with CCTV, retailers and ASIST has resulted in an improved detection rate and an increase in intelligence gathering and prevention opportunities.

32Rape detection rate113.6%61.1%52.5%The Divisional Rape Investigation Unit was formed in March 2013 and dedicated officers have investigated a considerable number of rapes and other sexual offences of a complex and often historical nature. The expert nature of the team has identified further victims which had previously gone unreported explaining the significant increase in detections. Public protection remains a priority for the area and tackling predatory behaviour by encouraging victims to report offences is vital in protecting our communities.The rape detection rate for the division is 75% for 2014/15. These complex and sensitive enquiries, often historical, can take a considerable amount of time to thoroughly and robustly investigate; therefore the detection rate at this early stage in the year of 12.5% does not reflect an accurate picture in terms of the likely outcome of these enquiries at a later stage.

Casualty reduction is our main priority as a force in relation to road safety. Inverclyde officers continue to focus on influencing driver's behaviour through a series of enforcement and education campaigns in order to continue this encouraging downward trend in casualties. We will continue to focus activity in and around schools and known black spot areas.					

Road Safety & Road Crime

Keeping people safe through safer roads and reducing road crime is a national and local priority. The number of road casualties in Inverclyde has reduced significantly over the last year which can be attributed to an increased and sustained focus on driving offences. Dedicated officers in road policing and operation Quattro have continued to influence driver's behaviour through education and enforcement on our roads. The reduction in dangerous driving, speeding and disqualified driving offences show that Inverclyde residents are understanding the dangers and reducing the risk to themselves and other road users. The increased fixed penalty fines for offences such as seat belts and using mobile phones whilst driving together with an increased awareness of the risks has assisted in reducing the number of residents being issued with fines/reported for these offences.

Year to date there has been 27 detections for drink driving across the division.
